1. INTRODUCTION TO THIS INSTRUCTIONS MANUAL

This manual provides the correct procedures and requirements for installing B680H and maintaining it in a safe condition.

In Europe, the automation of a barrier falls under the Machinery Directive 2006/42/EC and the corresponding harmonised standards. Anyone automating a barrier (new or existing) is classified as the Manufacturer of the Machine. They are therefore required by law, among other things, to carry out a risk analysis of the machine (automatic barrier in its entirety) and take protective measures to fulfil the essential safety requirements specified in Annex I of the Machinery Directive.

FAAC S.p.A. recommends that you always comply with the EN 12453 standard and in particular that you adopt the safety criteria and devices indicated, without exception, including the dead-man function.

This manual contains references to European standards. The automation of a barrier must fully comply with any laws, standards and regulations applicable in the country where installation will take place.

2.1 UNPACKING AND HANDLING

- 1. Carefully set the package down on the ground.
- 2. Cut the packaging in order to open it completely and remove all the packaging material.
- 3. Stand the barrier on the base.
- 4. Check that all components are present and intact ((1)1):
- 1 B680H barrier body
- 2 Installation accessories
- 3 Hazard warning sticker

CLOSE THE VENT HOLE WHEN HANDLING

The B680H is supplied with the vent hole closed with a screw and washer. When handling the barrier, the vent hole should be closed to prevent oil leaks (2).

2.2 PRODUCT IDENTIFICATION

The product is identified by the plate ($\bigcirc 3$).

MARKINGS ON THE PRODUCT



Risk of electric shock from live parts. Located on the cover of the electronic equipment housing.



Indicates the screw to be removed before putting into service. Located next to the oil filler plug.



Risk of cutting, crushing or shearing of fingers or a hand between the beam and the barrier body. It must be placed on the trunk by the installation engineer.

2.3 INTENDED USE

The B680H barriers are designed for vehicle access control in residential buildings/apartment complexes / Industrial facilities / Car parks.

To move the beam manually, follow the instructions for manual functioning.

Any other use that is not expressly specified in these instructions is prohibited and could affect the integrity of the product and/or represent a source of danger.

2.4 LIMITATIONS OF USE

Comply with the limitations on frequency of use listed in the technical data section.

The B680H requires the use of a specific FAAC beam that conforms to the dimensions indicated in this manual. Only the FAAC accessories indicated in this manual should be installed on the beam.

The B680H requires the use of a FAAC spring that is adequate for counterbalancing the weight of the beam and the relative accessories.

The barriers with exclusively vehicle access control must be fitted with suitable visible signs prohibiting foot traffic. A separate route for foot traffic outside the range of the beam must be provided and properly indicated.

If foot traffic cannot be ruled out, the barrier falls within the scope of the EN 12453 standard.

The presence of weather conditions such as snow, ice and strong wind, even occasional, could affect the correct operation of the automation, the integrity of the components and be a potential source of danger (see § Emergency use). The limitations of use of the B680H in wind are detailed in table III Limits of use in relation to wind.

The installation must be visible during the day and at night. If it is not, appropriate solutions must be provided to make the fixed and moving parts visible.

Implementing the automation requires the installation of the necessary safety devices, identified by the installer through an appropriate risk assessment of the installation site.

2.5 UNAUTHORISED USE

- Uses other than the intended use are prohibited.
- It is prohibited to install the automation system outside of the limits specified in the Technical Data and in the Mechanical and Electrical Installation Requirements.
- It is forbidden to use B680H in a constructional configuration other than the one provided by the manufacturer.
- No component part of the product may be modified.
- It is prohibited to install the automation system in environments in which there is a risk of explosion and/or fire: the presence of flammable gases or fumes is a serious safety hazard (the product is not ATEX certified).
- It is prohibited to power the system with energy sources other than those specified.
- It is prohibited to integrate commercial systems and/or equipment other than those specified, or use them for purposes not intended and authorised by their respective manufacturers.
- Do not expose the barrier to direct jets of water of any type and size.
- Do not expose the barrier to aggressive chemical or environmental agents.
- The barrier may not be used to move moving parts other than the beams produced by FAAC specified in this manual.
- Use to control pedestrian access, bicycle traffic and the passage of animals is prohibited.
- Use of the barrier at level crossings is prohibited.
- Use of the barrier on public thoroughfares is prohibited.
- It is prohibited to use and/or install accessories which have not been specifically approved by FAAC S.p.A.
- It is prohibited to use the automation system before performing commissioning.
- It is prohibited to use the automation system in the presence of faults which could compromise safety.
- It is prohibited to use the automation system with the fixed and/or mobile guards removed or altered.
- Do not use the automation system unless the area of operation is free of persons, animals or objects.
- Do not enter/remain in the area of operation of the automation system while it is moving.
- Do not try to prevent the movement of the automation system.
- Do not climb or catch on to the beam or lift yourself up on it. Do not climb on the barrier cabinet.

- Do not allow children to approach or play in the area of operation of the automation system.
- Do not allow the control devices to be used by anyone who is not specifically authorised and trained to do so.
- Do not allow the control devices to be used by children or persons with mental and physical deficiencies unless they are supervised by an adult who is responsible for their safety.
- During manual handling, accompany the beam slowly for the entire stroke. Do not let the beam travel freely.

2.6 EMERGENCY USE

In emergencies or if there is a fault, turn off the power supply to the automation and disconnect the buffer batteries if there are any. If the beam can be moved safely by hand, use the MANUAL OPERATION mode; otherwise place the automation out of service until it has been reset/repaired.

In the case of a breakdown, the automation must be reset/repaired exclusively by the installer/maintenance technician.

2.7 TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS B680H

The B680H is a hydraulic barrier with a self-supporting structure and an E680S electronic board. The following components (supplied separately) are required for carrying out the installation:

- foundation plate
- external cabinet
- beam and relative beam bracket with balancing spring.

Barrier B680H RH/LH

The B680H barrier can be installed so that it closes to the right or left.

The opening direction of the barrier is defined by looking at it from the door side ($(\mathbf{S} \mathbf{5})$:

- RH barrier (right): the beam closes towards the right (in a clockwise direction)

- LH barrier (left): the beam closes towards the left (in an anticlockwise direction)

Oil-bath lubrication

Oil bath lubrication ensures silent operation, high heat dissipation and reduced wear.

Irreversible system

To allow manual operation, a release manoeuvre must be performed.

Absolute encoder

The encoder constantly detects the exact position of the beam and makes it possible to manage the end of stroke and slowdown positions stored in the setup.

Anti-crushing operation

The encoder allows the board to create the anticrushing feature:

- the recognition of an obstacle during closure causes the movement to be reversed.

Adjustable limit switches

The barrier is fitted with adjustable mechanical opening and closing limit switches.

Balancing system

A type S or L FAAC balancing spring has to be used, according to the length of the beam installed.

The balancing system is used to ensure the stability and control of the beam during movement and keep it operating properly over time.

Replaceable cabinet

The cabinet is not load-bearing and can therefore be replaced easily.

One-piece or modular beams

- one-piece or modular beam, two types: S or L
- - pivoting round beam
- - articulated round S beam

Indicator lights

Various types of indicator lights can be fitted to the barrier:

- flashing traffic light indicator integrated in the cabinet
- beam lights
- XLED external flashing light
- Configurations

Different configurations can be obtained by using two B680H barriers:

- Primary - Secondary configuration (6-A)

The Primary-Secondary configuration allows you to install two barriers that open in opposite directions.

- Interlock configuration (6-B)

The interlock function allows two barriers to be controlled where the opening of one is subject to the closing of the other.

FEATURES - ELECTRONIC BOARD E680S:

Switching power supply

The switching power supply reduces power consumption in stand-by mode, keeps the output voltage stable even in the event of fluctuations in the mains supply and works over a wide range of input voltages.

Display with programming buttons

There are three menus for programming from the board, via the display and dedicated buttons: BASIC, ADVANCED and EXPERT. The board is also designed to be programmed remotely via Simply Connect.

Simply Connect

A cloud platform that allows remote communication with the automation, with specific modes for the installer or user. The Simply Connect system requires a connectivity module (accessory) to plug in to the electronic board, which is chosen according to the technology to be used (Wi-Fi, LAN, GSM).

BUS 2easy connection

FAAC BUS 2easy devices (photocells and control devices) can be connected.

In order to operate the beam manually, the hydraulic circuit has to be released using the key.

RELEASING THE BARRIER



- 1. Insert the key and turn it anticlockwise until it stops.
- 2. Move the barrier manually.
- 3. Restore operation.

RESTORING OPERATION



- 1. Turn the key clockwise until it stops.
- 2. Check that manual movement is inhibited.
- 3. Remove the key.

3.2 INSTALLING THE BARRIER BODY

- 1. When the foundation has hardened, remove the 4 nuts and washers from the plate.
- 2. Place the barrier body on the foundation, in correspondence with the 4 fixing points.

Be careful not to damage the electrical cable tubes.

3. Insert the washers and nuts and tighten to the fastening torque indicated in the figure.

3.3 FITTING THE SPRING

PREPARING THE BALANCER

With reference to 215:

1. Remove the breather screw and put it in a safe place.



The breather screw will have to be put back if the barrier is moved.

- 2. Prepare the barrier for manual operation, see the MANUAL OPERATION section.
- 3. With reference to **316** bring the balancer **A** and the relative piston **B** into the open position.

INSERTING THE SPRING AND FASTENING THE PISTONS

RH Barrier: insert the spring onto the right piston LH Barrier: insert the spring onto the left piston.

- 1. Remove the pin A.
- 2. Insert the spring guide **B** onto the piston. The hole C must coincide with the piston bleed screw.
- 3. Insert the spring **D**.
- 4. Screw the ring-nut **E** until it is in contact with the spring **D**. Make sure that you insert the ring-nut the right way round.
- 5. Reinsert the pin **A** with washer into the fixing hole of the piston (see **§ 2**) and tighten the nut.
- 6. Fasten the other piston in a similar manner (see **8** 2).

3.4 INSTALL THE BRACKET AND BEAM

(i) If the beam has to be shortened, cut the end opposite the one with the fixing hole. After the cutting remove any sharp borders and burs.

- 1. Insert the spacer **A** and screw the guide **B** into the drive shaft on the barrier body.
- 2. Insert the plate **C** so that it rests on the spacer Make sure that you insert the plate the cor-A. rect way round.
- 3. Remove the guide **B** and put it to one side.
- 4. Fix in position with the screw **D**, interposing the washers E.

Do not apply grease to the fastening screw **D**.

- 5. Insert the adapter F.
- 6. Insert the beam G.

- 7. Mount the bracket H and secure it using the screws and washers (4 screws for the S beam and 6 for the L beam).
- 8. Insert the cover I and secure it with the screws.
- 9. Fasten the plate L.
- 10. Move the beam to the closed position.
- 11. Restore the barrier lock.

INSTALLING MODULAR BEAMS (OPTIONAL)

With reference to 219:

1. Connect joint **A** to joint **B**.



) Joint **B** has holes on both sides and must be positioned as shown in **319**.

- 2. Insert the joints into the beam and insert the fixing screws, but without tightening them.
- 3. Install the extension onto the joints and insert the screws.
- 4. Tighten the screws.

COMPLETING THE BEAM INSTALLATION

With reference to 20:

- 1. Apply the adhesive reflectors **C** to both sides of the beam.
- 2. Insert the optional profiles **D1** and **D2** by sliding them onto the beam.
 - The rubber profile (**D2**) must face the closing direction.
- 3. Place the cover **E** over the end of the beam and fix it in place with the screws.

INSTALLING ACCESSORIES ON THE BEAM

The accessories on the beam must be fitted before balancing the beam. After a modification of the beam, it is necessary to balance it again.



For fitting accessories to the beam, see § 7.

3.5 BALANCING THE BEAM

- 1. Release the barrier.
- 2. Bring the beam to 45° and release it: the beam is balanced correctly when it stays in position.
- 3. Make the adjustment, if necessary:
- if the beam tends to open, turn the spring preload ring nut anticlockwise
- if the beam tends to close, turn the spring preload ring nut clockwise
- 4. Repeat the adjustment until it is correctly balanced.
- 5. Restore the barrier lock.







3.6 LIMIT SWITCH ADJUSTMENT

- 1. Release the barrier.
- 2. Close the beam and keep it in this position.
- 3. Adjust the limit switch **A** until it is in contact with the balancer arm **B**.
- 4. Use a spirit level to make sure that the limit switch is correctly adjusted. Repeat the sequence if necessary.
- 5. When finished, tighten the locknut C to the fastening torque indicated.
- 6. Repeat the adjustment procedure with the beam open on the second limit switch.
- 7. Restore operation.

5. START-UP

Carry out the following operations referring to the § specific sections.

- 1. Make sure that the barrier B680H is locked and not operating in manual mode.
- 2. Switch on power to the system. The board lights up and the display then comes on:
 - firmware version (2 digits separated by a point).
 - 50 flashing if setup is requested, or the automation status.

If two barriers are installed in a Primary-Secondary configuration, the Secondary barrier has to be configured before you start to set up the Primary barrier (see § 8.1).

- 4. Memorise the radio controls of the system (see relative instructions).
- Program the E680S without carrying out the setup. In order for the barrier to work properly, set function cF according to the length of the beam.
- 6. Check the direction of movement.
- 7. Carry out the setup procedure.
- 8. If you use an XBAT 24 battery, connect the battery after having carried out the setup. Connect it with the power supply disconnected.

- Press and hold the F button, then the + button as well for about 10 seconds: the first function (□I) appears on the display, which is displayed as long as button F remains pressed.
- 2. Release the buttons: the display shows the value of the function.
- 3. Press the + or − button to modify, then press the F button to confirm to go to the next function.

Proceed in the same way for all the functions.

- Exiting programming mode
- Every modified value becomes effective immediately, but when exiting from programming mode you have to decide whether to save the modifications or not. Modifications are lost if no buttons have been pressed for 10 minutes or if power to the board is disconnected before they have been saved.
- Press and hold down the **F** button, then the + button as well.

Alternatively, scroll through the programming menu until you reach the last function (5E).

10.3 AIR BLEEDING PROCEDURE

If the beam movement is irregular, bleed the air as follows:



If parameters $F\Box$ and $F\Box$ in ADVANCED Programming have been modified and a value less than the default has been set, we recommend that you set them to an equal or higher value during bleeding in order to make it easier to bleed the air.

- 1. Open the automation electronically.
- 2. Once it is open, slightly loosen the bleed screw A of the piston with the balancing spring.
- 3. Re-tighten after air, foam or oil has been removed.
- 4. Carry out a closing cycle.

- 5. Once it is closed, slightly loosen the bleed screw **B** of the piston without the balancing spring.
- 6. Re-tighten after air, foam or oil has been removed.
- Bleeding is complete when drops of oil come out of both pistons and the beam moves smoothly.



8. Check the oil level, top up if necessary.

Be careful when doing this as the pistons contain oil under pressure, which could escape if the screws are loosened too much.

10.5 REVERSING THE OPENING DIRECTION

The direction in which the barrier will open is decided when it is installed. If the opening direction has to be reversed, proceed as follows.

Preliminary operations

With reference to **343-1**:

- 1. Remove the cover
- 2. Release the barrier and move the beam so that it is vertical.
- 3. Lock the operator again.
- 4. Remove the beam and beam bracket.

Remove the spring unit

With reference to **343-2**:

- 1. Remove the fastener that connects the plunger piston to the balancer arm.
- 2. Unscrew the preload ring nut.
- 3. Remove the balancing spring and the spring guide.
- 4. Connect the plunger piston to the correct fixing hole.

Install the spring assembly on the piston on the opposite side

With reference to **243-3**:

- 1. Remove the fixing screw of the plunger piston on the opposite side.
- 2. Unlock the automation.
- 3. Rotate the balancer by 90° and replace, in the following order, the spring guide, the balancing spring and the ring nut in the plunger piston on the new closing side.
- 4. Fasten the plunger piston to the balancer arm.
- 5. Install the beam and beam bracket.
- 6. Balance the system again.
- 7. Lock the operator.
- 8. Invert the motor cable connection.
- 9. Put the cover back.



11. INSTRUCTIONS FOR USE

It is the responsibility of the machine installer/ manufacturer to draft the user instructions of the automation in accordance with the Machinery Directive, including all the required information and instructions based on the characteristics of the automation.

The guidelines below, which are purely indicative and in no way exhaustive, help the installer draft the user instructions.

The installer must provide the owner/operator of the automation with the EC Declaration, the system Logbook with the maintenance schedule and the user instructions of the automation.

The installer must inform the owner/operator of any residual risks and the intended use and ways in which the machine should not be used.

The owner is responsible for operating the automation and must:

- comply with all User instructions provided by the installer/maintenance technician and the Safety recommendations

- keep the user instructions
- have the maintenance schedule implemented

- keep the system Logbook, which must be completed

by the maintenance technician at the end of all servicing

11.1 SAFETY RECOMMENDATIONS

The plants made with FAAC buried actuators B680H series are intended for vehicular traffic.

The user must be in good physical and mental health and be aware of and responsible for the dangers which use of the product can lead to.

- Do not use the automation unless the area of operation is free of persons, animals or objects.
- Do not enter/remain in the area of operation of the automation while it is moving.
- Do not allow children to approach or play in the area of operation of the automation.
- Do not try to prevent the movement of the automation.
- Do not climb, hold onto or let yourself be pulled along by the beam.
- Do not allow the control devices to be used by anyone who is not specifically authorised and trained to do so.
- Do not allow the control devices to be used by children or persons with mental and physical deficiencies unless they are supervised by an adult who is responsible for their safety.
- Do not use the automation if there are faults that could compromise safety.
- Do not expose the automation system to corrosive chemical or atmospheric agents; do not expose the automation to water jets of any type or size.
- Do not perform any work on the components of the automation.

Risk of cutting, crushing or losing fingers or a hand between the beam and the cabinet when the beam is moving. Do not approach the barrier, do not put your hands in the danger area during movement.

11.2 EMERGENCY USE

In emergencies or if there is a fault, turn off the power supply to the automation and disconnect the buffer batteries if there are any. If the beam can be moved safely by hand, use the MANUAL OPERATION mode; otherwise place the automation out of service until it has been reset/repaired.

In the case of a breakdown, the automation must be reset/repaired exclusively by the installer/maintenance technician.

For atmospheric events outside the resistance to wind limits indicated in the table in alert situations it is necessary to put the barrier out of service with closed, locked beam and request the assistance of the installation engineer to remove the beam.

11.3 MANUAL OPERATION

In order to operate the beam manually, the gearmotor has to be released using the lever with key.

RELEASE MANOEUVRE



- 1. Open the lock cover. Insert the key and turn it anticlockwise until it stops.
- 2. Move the barrier manually.
- 3. Restore operation.

RESTORING OPERATION



- 1. Turn the key clockwise until it stops.
- 2. Check that manual movement is inhibited.
- 3. Remove the key and close the cover.

The loop must be implemented at least 150 mm from fixed metal objects, at least 500 mm from moving metal objects and no more than 50 mm from the road surface.



- 1. Prepare a PVC cable duct or make a chase in the ground (avoid 45° corners to prevent breaking the cable).
- 2. Use a normal single-pole 1.5 mm² diameter cable. If the cable is buried directly, it must be double insulated.
- 3. Preferably, induction loops are made square or rectangular.
- 4. Install the cable with the number of turns indicated in the table.
- 5. Twist the two ends of the cable from the loop to the E680S board at least 20 times per metre.

Avoid making joints in the cable but if it is necessary to do so, solder the conductors and seal the joint with heat shrink tubing and keep it separate from mains power lines.

The E680S board has an integrated metal mass detector for detecting vehicles via induction.

Features

- Galvanic separation between the electronics of the detector and the loop
- Automatic system alignment immediately after activation
- Continuous resetting of frequency drifts
- Sensitivity independent of loop inductivity.
- Loop working frequency regulation with automatic selection.
- Loop engaged message with LED display
- Loop status addressable on outputs

Connection

Connect the loops (see 245)

- LOOP1 = loop with opening function;
- LOOP2 = loop with closing and/or safety in closing function.

For information about the effect of signals emitted by the loops on the automation, please refer to the logics in section §7.3.

To enable the operation of the connected loops:

1. Go to BASIC programming and set steps L1 and L2 to ∃ according to the number and type of loops connected.



If only one loop is installed, enable only the corresponding programming step.

The operating status of the loop detector is indicated by two status LEDs **DL3** and **DL4**.

If function $\lfloor 1 \text{ or } \lfloor 2 \rceil$ is disabled, the loop detection status is still available on the outputs, if suitably configured (see parameters $\Box \rfloor ... \Box \dashv$ in ADVANCED programming)

Calibration

- With the board in display mode, press the CAL1 button at any time to calibrate the loop connected to input LOOP1 or the CAL2 button to calibrate the loop connected to input LOOP2.
- Alternatively, switch the power off to the board for at least 10 seconds and then switch it on again.

Board diagnostics

Calibration is indicated by the board diagnostics by the flashing of the two LEDs **DL3** and **DL4**. Once the calibration has been carried out, they indicate the detection status of the loop, if connected.

The signals provided by the board diagnostics are shown in table \boxplus **19**.

If one or both the magnetic loops are not installed, after an initial calibration attempt, the loop detector will make the two status LEDs flash every 5 seconds.

Sensitivity adjustment

Adjusting the sensitivity of the loop detector, causes a variation in the inductance, for each channel, that a vehicle has to cause in order to activate the relative detector output.

Sensitivity adjustment is carried out separately for each channel, using the two parameters 51 and 52 in BASIC programming.
